2008 Festival of Flowers Topiary Flower Display

Surely by now everyone has heard about the 2008 Festival of Flowers Topiary Flower Display. The Lakelands Master Gardeners will be participating along with The Burton Center, Lander University, Piedmont Tech, Ware Shoals High, Merrywood Elementary, Woodfields Elementary, Pinecrest Elementary, Magnolia Garden Club, and Laurel Garden Club to mention a few. Dwight Long will be the coordinator over this project. There will be approximately 16 topiaries showcased in the Uptown area. Master Gardeners will be working to complete a 14 foot giraffe. The frames are on order, but art design is our first order of business. We will be meeting soon to discuss design and plant possibilities. We will install irrigation tubes inside the topiaries through techniques used by professionals from Florida Irrigation. We will then stuff moss around the irrigation system and finally plug the plants.

Master Gardeners will also be tending the topiaries while they are on display Uptown during three weeks in June. We will check each topiary and make sure plants are in good shape. If not, we will remove dead plants and have them replaced. This is another way to earn those valuable volunteer hours.

Another way to earn hours is by volunteering to help oversee a topiary. The organizations participating may have questions and need a liaison to go to in order to find answers. Master Gardeners serving in this area will have the information necessary to make the project run smoothly.
