Boxelder Bugs

Adult Boxelder bugs, *Boisea trivittata* (Say), Rhopalidae, HEMIPTERA, are about ½ inch long and 1/3 inch wide. They are dark brown to black in color with red markings on their backs. The abdomen is bright red under the wings. Boxelder bugs feed primarily on the seed-bearing boxelder trees by sucking sap from the leaves, tender twigs and developing seeds. Occasionally the boxelder bug has been seen feeding on silver maple, other maples, ash, plum, cherry, apple, peach, grape, and strawberries, causing some scarring and dimpling of fruit.

Nymphs are similar to adults in shape except they are smaller, wingless and bright red.



Boxelder bugs cannot bite or sting but their piercing-sucking mouthparts *can* sometimes puncture skin, causing slight irritation. The boxelder bug may enter buildings by crawling or flying during the warm days of autumn for hibernation. The bugs enter through cracks in the foundation, windows, doors, under siding and shingles. During late winter and early spring, they become active on warm sunny days and search for egg laying sites. The bugs may become trapped inside the home. The bugs are not harmful to household furnishings, clothing or food products, but can be annoying when crawling or flying around as they attempt to escape to the outside and their droppings stain curtains and other resting sites. The boxelder bug emits a foul odor when crushed.

Control Measures Outdoors

Boxelder bugs breed on female (pistillate) boxelder trees. The removal of these trees and replacing with male (staminate) trees may reduce the population. Correct identification of the bug is important. The wholesale cutting of boxelder trees is not recommended because these insects can fly in from anywhere in the neighborhood. If one or two trees of no particular value are infested their removal may be best for long-term control.

Young exposed nymphs and adults on the host trees may be treated with insecticides. Insecticides should be applied to the trunk, limbs and foliage of infested trees in the spring and early summer.

Spraying of trees is best done by a professional.

Perimeter foundation treatments with chemicals also may provide good control. The spray is applied to all surfaces that the bugs crawl, foundation walls, sidewalks, and fencerows. Choose an insecticide labeled for homeowner use as a foundation or outside perimeter treatment for household pests. Read and follow all label directions. The label is the law.

Infestations can be prevented or reduced by eliminating potential hiding places around the house such as piles of boards, rocks and leaves.

Be sure to caulk and close any openings that the boxelder bug can enter the home such as around light fixtures, doors and windows, unscreened vents, holes in walls around utility pipes and conduits, air conditioners and heat pumps. The boxelder bug is attracted to lights and can fly in open doors and windows. Be sure to screen all windows, doors, crawl spaces, exhaust and roof vents and louvers.

Control Measures Indoors

Indoor control is difficult. Household foggers or "bug bombs" will not provide effective control. The pests are hidden in areas that are mostly inaccessible to insecticides. Use a vacuum cleaner to remove bugs indoors. It is best to use a vacuum with a HEPA filter to prevent insect parts from being circulated in the air. The vacuum cleaner bag should be placed inside a plastic bag and sealed then placed inside a tightly sealed outdoor garbage can.

Household insecticidal aerosols and many household spray cleaners also are effective when applied directly to individual Insects. These measures provide temporary relief only.

When infestations affect large areas or occur in areas requiring specialized spray equipment, a professional pest control operator may be needed.

SEWING SEEDS OUTSIDE IN THE WINTER

I'm a seed addict and collect more than I can grow in my portable four tier mini-greenhouse. I also trade seeds on Dave's Garden website. After watching my precious seedlings damp off after sowing them in the spring, I searched the internet for solutions. Wintersown.org is a website that explains all the details about growing seeds in the winter outdoors, in micro-self-constructed terrariums. Following their instructions last year, I used 2 liter pop bottles, translucent milk jugs, takeout food containers, and anything plastic that allowed light. The steps are briefly as follows:

- 1) Slice the bottles in half horizontally to create a top and bottom
- 2) Stab/slice a few slits in the bottom and top for drainage/transpiration
- 3) Label the bottom with the plant name using a water-resistant tape and sharpie marker
- 4) Fill the bottom part of the container to within ½" of the edge, with any cheap potting soil
- 5) Soak the potting soil
- 6) Plant the seeds at depth recommended on package
- 7) Recreate the container by taping the top back on to create a fairly good seal
- 8) Leave the caps on the bottles until you need to add water later on in the spring (I didn't need to)
 You might also need to remove the bottle caps to increase transpiration
- 9) Leave the containers outside in semi-shade, against the house, in a window well, or on a porch

Beyond this, all I did was check the containers periodically, and amazingly, all the seeds germinated with no damping off. Moreover, there is no need for complicating lighting/heating systems, hardening the seedlings off, or even transplanting them into larger pots. Simply put only a few seeds in each container. I had to be careful not to bake the seedlings on warm sunny days. That's why a shady location works best. The container tops can be untaped and totally removed in late March/early April. You will then need to water frequently.

The website has a list of seeds for Zone 8 and the month they should be started. Last year my seeds were all half hardy perennials planted in January, but this year I plan on expanding my experiment to heat-loving annuals such as zinnias, marigolds, and celosia, which can be started in March.



Try it; I think you'll be a convert too.
