### Asparagus

"As quick as cooking asparagus." was an old Roman saying meaning something was accomplished quickly according to reports on asparagus history. This member of the lily family dates back to 1000 A.D. The graceful spears and feathery growth often served as a sign of elegance and were a delicacy only the wealthy could afford. The Roman emperors even had a special team of workers that harvested the crop for them.

Reputed as an aphrodisiac, this ancient vegetable is one of the most nutritionally well-balanced vegetables -- high in folic acid and a good source of potassium, fiber, thiamin, and vitamins A, B6, and C. A 5-ounce serving provides 60% of the RDA for folic acid and is low in calories.

Even though China and California are big producers of this crop it is not new to South Carolina with the first reference of it growing commercially was in the early 1890's in the Charleston area and the variety was known as "Palmetto". It was a viable cash crop in our state for a half a century.

I'm coming up on my third year with the asparagus crowns, "Jersey Knight" that I planted in my raised bed garden. I'm looking forward to a good harvest this spring.

#### <u>Caramelized Asparagus</u> <u>Submitted by Gail Murph</u>

This recipe was printed in the Thymes in 2006.

2 bundles of asparagus, trimmed and washed ½ stick butter 3 tablespoons olive oil

Heat butter and oil in sauté pan on medium high. When thoroughly heated, add asparagus to pan and stir occasionally. Salt and pepper is added to taste.

When asparagus is almost done (only a few minutes) add 1 tablespoon granulated sugar to caramelize. After a minute add 2 to 3 tablespoons balsamic vinegar, stirring thoroughly to fully coat the asparagus.

I want to introduce you to my best gardening buddy, my MP3 player (an IPhone or IPad works too).

Each week I download free audio podcasts by both serious gardening experts and silly blogger celebrities onto my MP3. My mellifluous friend Ken Druse walks my dog with me and explains "sustainable" gardening techniques with such guests as Rick Darke and John Greenlee. My erudite ex-Martha Stewart editor, Margaret Roach, gently explains using cloches to speed seed germination. The silly Jean Ann Van Krevelen (vegetable garden author) and Amanda Thomsen (blogger for Fine Gardening magazine) discuss things they hate about gardening in their Resent-O-Cast (J-Lo and Marc Antony and weeding), or their passions in their Grat-O-Cast (Godsmacote and P. Allen Smith, for example). BBC Radio's Gardeners' Question Time is rife with fascinating gardening panelists such as Bob Flowerdew (uses junked freezers for raised beds), and Matt Biggs (repeat Chelsea gold medalist). It takes some fiddling to download these podcasts. If you have ITunes on your computer it is easier. All my favorites are on there, but ITunes can do strange things to a computer, therefore I don't have it. I go to each website and temporarily save the MP3 files for download onto my machine each week. With ITunes, this is all done automatically, once you subscribe to the podcast.

- 7. Gardens Illustrated Podcasts- celebrities such as Beth Chatto, Alan Titchmarsh, Penelope Hobhouse in extended interviews
- 8. Felder Rushing- eccentric Mississippi Public Radio gardening personality/extension agent
