Frosty, but not the Snowman! By Janice H. Haldeman, PhD

Hope Harrison emailed with a guestion about, and an image of a little Christmas season plant commonly called "Frosty Fern" which she had purchased. By coincidence I had also just purchased one at a grocery store. The plant is a member of one of my favorite plant groups, and was one of the

"Dinosaur Plants" featured in our Discovery Garden program this past summer.

Frosty Fern is also an example of many plants with misleading common names. First, it is not a fern, though branches of some do appear fernlike. Secondly, these plants are also commonly called "Club Mosses" and "Spike Mosses," but they are also not mosses. There's just no accurate common name for this plant, so one has to resort to its botanical name to be accurate. Plants are in the genus Selaginella, pronounced Suh-ladge'-ih-NELL-uh! There are at least 700 natural species in this genus, and horticulture has made many available for nursery



sales. This site shows images of some of these, some with large branches do resemble ferns and others that grow low and mat-like resemble mosses.

"Frosty Fern's" botanical name is Selaginella kraussiana, and the plant originated in Africa. The white frosty look of its branch tips is called variegation. "Frosty Fern " is a variegated Selaginella. Many plants sometimes develop white patterning. It can be genetic or caused by a virus. The patterning often results in a horiculturally desirable plant that sells like mad. When this variegation of Selaginella kraussiana was discovered, someone probably hoped it would be a great Christmas seller, maybe in the league with Poinsettias!

So how does "Frosty Fern" fit the "Dinosaur Plant" category? Well, the larger group of plants to which Selaginellas belong is commonly called Fern Allies or botanically, Lycopods. Both "real" ferns and Locopods go back a long long way, and provided food for vegetarian and omnivorous dinosaurs and fellow creatures of that time. There are many fossils of these plants dated 300+ million years

ago, indicating that back then, many were MUCH larger and formed great forests. Today these forests are burning in our coal-based power plants and other coal-based industries, as well as in our car engines!

Lycopods from early times are now represented by smaller descendants, due to the rise of plants with seeds and flowers as well as climate and other environmental changes. Like true ferns and mosses, these plants reproduce with spores, not seeds. There are at least four native species of Selaginella growing in South Carolina, and many more species of ancient origin growing throughout the US. Most grow best in moist shady environments common throughout our country in dinosaur times, and a few have also adapted to desert conditions.

THEY'RE HERE!! Our own new Master Gardener graduate, Marla Starling, works at Park Seed and gave us brand spanking new catalogues at the Christmas Party. I've also started getting other seed catalogues in the mail. (Pinetree Seeds is good for smaller quantities of seed and has some exotic international offerings too.)

To keep my purchasing fervor under control, I start by setting a budget. Then it's fun to go through the catalogues without a thought of budget or planting space and just circle everything that looks entrancing. Finally, the winnowing begins. I try to only buy things that I can't easily get from the Farmer's Market and things that I actually love to eat. Of course everyone has their own system for organizing catalogue purchases. I start with a general idea of what I liked eating last year and new seeds I learned about during the year. After making this list, I look at the super-duper new 2015 introductions that I circled in each catalogue. This year, I learned about Kellogg's Breakfast tomato from several gardening podcasts I listen to on my MP3 player. Dave Whitinger from All About Plants website, sells out of these at his farmer's market stall, so I'm giving it a try at Park Seed.

Naturally, a packet of my namesake, 2015 introduction 'Lettuce Sandy' will be in my Park Seed order. It's a green oakleaf that is slow to bolt, heat tolerant, and can be harvested "leaf by leaf" or as a head.

Who doesn't love dark purple veggies? Every year Trionfo Violetto beans are great tasting, stringless, and beautiful in

the garden. Brussels Sprouts 'Falstaff' will also be on the list, as the leaves of the plant can be eaten in salads, so even if the sprouts are late to form, you get good usage of the plant. The leaves can also be braised in olive oil and balsamic vinegar with roasted walnuts. My husband doesn't even know he's eating Brussels sprouts.

Chiogga Guardsmark will be my "go to" beet. I've never really gotten great beets from any kind of seed, but the greens are fabulous in salads. 'White Comet' Eggplant will be in my front door urns after it is grown on to flowering stage, since it has "showy foliage and handsome purple blooms".

Kale Lacinato is Park's version of dinosaur kale, or Nero di Tosca as it is sometimes called in other catalogues. I've planted it with other kales that will get eaten to bits by cabbage moth butterfly caterpillars, but the thick leaves of the Lacinato are untouched.

Finally, Park's exclusive zucchini 'Poquito' is interesting. It's a bush style squash that can be picked at just 3 inches and the plant fruits continuously all season.

Now, onto some other catalogues, so I can get my Aspabroc Broccoli (tastes like asparagus), Minowase daikon radish, strawberry spinach, and hops. Have a wonderful time on your search.

Plant Recommendations

Who doesn't love a plant that offers fragrant blooms during the months of January through March? **Edgeworthia chrysantha**– Rice paper plant blooms on bare stems during the winter months. This is one of my favorite plants. It is a native of China, in the same family as Daphne. Hardy from zone 7b– 10b. It likes afternoon shade and can handle some sun if kept watered. As with Daphne, it does not like wet feet, with our clay soil make sure to have good drainage. Mature plants can get up to 8 feet by 8 feet. Each node has three stems emerging forming an open umbrella form. The bark is smooth. When the leaves emerge they are glaucus (blue-green in



color) and are velvety in texture. So far I have had no pest, large or small, on

these plants. Last year's single digit temperatures caused a little dieback, easily pruned out.

Looking for some winter interest in your garden? Try an Edgeworthia chrysantha.
