

The Elsley Home Garden

520 Bryte Street

An informal one acre shade garden created over the past 35 years and dominated by numerous mature native Oak trees. Beneath this high tree canopy, a middle layer of smaller evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs (Japanese Maples, Camellias, Rhododendrons, Hydrangeas) has been established. A lower shaded ground level has provided ideal conditions for an extensive range of herbaceous perennials (Hellebores, Hostas, Ferns). This rich and diverse range of plantings reflect the owners professional and personal interests, provide year – round ornamental appeal and compliment a 60 year old ranch – style home. A small kitchen garden utilizes limited sunlight, producing herbs and greens. The entire garden is served by an irrigation system with sprinkler heads located on tree trunks 15' above ground level.

Two recently installed Stumperies – a popular Victorian feature – create a striking architectural environment for displaying shade loving plants. Antique English chimney pots and "mushroom-like" staddle stones add further architectural appeal to this urban South Carolina garden.

The Patrick Home Garden

718 Chinquapin Road

This woodland garden offers a soothing retreat for the lucky visitor. Along trails of native plants, dogwoods and large stone, visitors are drawn to the garden pond bordered by natural sitting areas offering beautiful vistas to the house and surrounding forest. Boulders provide appropriate flanking material for the tranquil water features ensuring attention to detail in this stunningly lush garden setting. Children will especially enjoy the added features surrounding the waterfall. Creating vertical and visual interest, steps of stone and brick and areas of grass link different levels making passage through this garden a journey of exploration and delight.

President Barbara and Sandy Orr roadtrip to Raleigh and Big Bloomers Nursery- Sandy Orr



Cercis canadensis "Carolina Sweet heart" has startling multi-colored new growth. This was one of an amazing array of perennials, shrubs, conifers, and trees for sale at Big Bloomers, in the middle of nowhere, (Sanford, NC). Eight or more huge hoop houses are wall- to- wall plants. You must see this place to believe it. Most perennials are in four inch pots and are priced at \$4.75 or \$5.75. Some of many purchases were patrinia, thalictrum, persicaria polymorpha, and veronicastrum.

We also went to JC Raulston Arboretum, a mature botanical garden that features old gorgeous trees you've only seen in Michael Dirr's books. The mixed perennial borders were a tad overgrown (my style, but Barbara wanted them reworked). It is well worth a swing through Raleigh. While there, we heard a lecture by John Elsley on his favorite worldwide gardens. Since we were there with John and his wife, we met Tony Avent, owner of Plant Delights Nursery and toured his marvelous woodland botanical garden, Juniper Level. An expert botanist, he explained that the binomial nomenclature of horticulture may be pronounced in a variety of ways, since Latin is a dead language. This has freed me up to butcher even more Latin names.
