# By Popular Demand, Barbara Wells' Chocolate Cake Recipe from the Annual Awards Dinner



### INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 3/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1½ teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon espresso powder
- 1 cup milk
- ½ cup vegetable or canola oil
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup boiling water
- Chocolate Buttercream Frosting Recipe

### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350° F. Prepare two 9-inch cake pans by spraying with baking spray or buttering and lightly flouring.
- 2. For the cake:
- 3. Add flour, sugar, cocoa, baking powder, baking soda, salt and espresso powder to a large bowl or the bowl of a stand mixer. Whisk through to combine or, using your paddle attachment, stir through flour mixture until combined well.
- 4. Add milk, vegetable oil, eggs, and vanilla to flour mixture and mix together on medium speed until well combined. Reduce speed and carefully add boiling water to the cake batter. Beat on high speed for about 1 minute to add air to the batter.
- 5. Distribute cake batter evenly between the two prepared cake pans. Bake for 30-35 minutes, until a toothpick or cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean.
- 6. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for about 10 minutes, remove from the pan and cool completely.
- 7. Frost cake with Chocolate Buttercream Frosting.

The cake batter will be very thin after adding the boiling water. This is correct and results in the most delicious and moist chocolate cake I've ever tasted!

### PERFECT CHOCOLATE BUTTERCREAM FROSTING RECIPE

### **INGREDIENTS**

11/2 cups butter (3 sticks), softened

1 cup unsweetened cocoa

5 cups confectioner's sugar

½ cup milk

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

½ teaspoon espresso powder

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Add cocoa to a large bowl or bowl of stand mixer. Whisk through to remove any lumps.
- 2. Cream together butter and cocoa powder until well-combined.
- 3. Add sugar and milk to cocoa mixture by adding 1 cup of sugar followed by about a tablespoon of milk. After each addition has been combined, turn mixer onto a high speed for about a minute. Repeat until all sugar and milk have been added.
- 4. Add vanilla extract and espresso powder and combine well.
- 5. If frosting appears too dry, add more milk, a tablespoon at a time until it reaches the right consistency. If it appears to wet and does not hold its form, add more confectioner's sugar, a tablespoon at a time until it reaches the right consistency.

TABLETOP ARRANGEMENT OF THINGS FOUND IN YARD IN FEBRUARY-Hellebores, nandina, a few storebought roses, and some dusty Zenobia (shrub that holds orange fall color long into winter) provide luncheon arrangement, with succulents borrowed from Greenhouse. (blue rosettes barely visible). Flame the cut ends of the hellebores for 30 seconds before using them in water or oasis to avoid wilting. This works for any milky sapped plants such as poppies too.

**FRUITS OF WINTER SOWING EMERGE**-Arugula, peas, lettuce, white honesty, orange chard, and teasel grace a sun spot. Peas will not be eaten by squirrels if they are pre-sprouted, rather than planted directly into the ground! These seedlings will be transplanted to small recycled cell packs.
