NEONICOTINOIDS BEING PHASED OUT MANY PLACES- Chris Ester source, excerpted by Sandy Orr

Neonicotinoids have increasingly been tied to problems for pollinators. They are neuro-active agents chemically similar to nicotine. Honey bees and even native bees have shown to have foraging and reproductive impairment due to these insecticides. They exist as soil drenches, sprays, systemic insecticides, and granules. They are in the systems of plants that are treated with these chemicals, and therefore are added to our gardens even though we are not using the chemicals ourselves. (One must ask, if nictinoids are fatal to pollinators, how is nicotiana, both ornamental and commercial tobacco pollinated?) Some of the chemical names of these neonics to avoid are imidacloprid, acetamiprid, dinotefuran, clothianidin, and thiamethoxam. Both Home Depot and Lowe's have pledged to stop selling neonic-treated plants by the end of 2018 and 2019, respectively. Last year, Walmart, Costco and True Value announced that they are beginning to phase out neonicotinoid-treated plants.

LEMON BLUEBERRY CAKE RECIPE-(from Annual Banquet) Jimmy McInville

For the Lemon Blueberry Cake:

- 3 cups cake flour + 2 tablespoons cake flour, divided
- 22 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoons salt
- 8 ounces unsalted butter, room temperature
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon organic lemon zest
- ¾ cup whole milk
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- 2 cups wild blueberries, frozen or fresh

For the Lemon Cream Cheese Frosting:

16 ounces cream cheese, softened

- 8 ounces unsalted butter, softened
- 4-6 cups confectioners' sugar (depends on sweetness desired, I used 5 cups)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon organic lemon zest
- 2 tablespoon lemon juice

For the Assembly:

- Lemon slices
- Fresh blueberries
- Edible flowers (optional)

Instructions

Make the Lemon Blueberry Cake:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350. Butter and lightly flour three 8" round pans. Line with parchment paper circles.
- 2. Sift together 3 cups cake flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.
- 3. In a small bowl, combine milk and lemon juice. Stir to combine and set aside for milk to curdle. This is similar to making homemade buttermilk!
- 4. In the bowl of a mixer, beat butter and sugar on medium-high using paddle attachment. Beat until pale and fluffy, about 4 minutes.
- 5. With the mixer on low, add eggs one at a time. Mix well after each egg.
- 6. Add vanilla extract and lemon zest. Mix to combine.
- Add the flour mixture in three batches, alternating with the milk, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Do not over mix. Stop the mixer and scrape down the sides of the bowl.
- 8. In a small bowl, gently toss blueberries with 2 teaspoons cake flour to coat. Using a spoon or spatula, gently fold blueberries into batter, being careful not to break berries.
- 9. Divide batter evenly between the three 8" round pans.
- 10. Bake for 30 33 minutes, until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean.
- 11. Let cool in pans for 10 15 minutes, then remove to wire rack to finish cooling.

Make the Cream Cheese Frosting

- 1. Using a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, mix the butter and cream cheese until smooth.
- 2. Add vanilla, lemon zest and juice and mix until combined.
- 3. Gradually add confectioners sugar, adjusting amount until desired sweetness is reached. Scrape down the sides of the bowl. Whip until smooth.

Notes:

- If using frozen blueberries in the cake, do not thaw before mixing into the cake batter.
 Avoid over mixing once the berries are added to prevent the cake batter from turning grayish-purple from their juices.
- If frosting is too thin after whipping, refrigerate for 30 minutes before assembling cake.
