Muhlenbergia Lindheimeri

One of the great joys of my autumn garden is **Muhlenbergia Lindheimeri**, or "Big Muhly", or White Muhly, a cousin to the more familiar purple muhly.

The white version is 1 ½ feet taller than the purple and blooms later. (That makes it about 4'X4' and a late October bloomer). It's hard to be patient when the purple is already at its peak. But the wait is worth it. In the morning sun, with dew on the inflorescences, there's nothing better. Moreover, the bloom is very long lasting.

It's native to Mexico and Texas, and was named after a German plant explorer who settled in New Braunfels, Texas. The most familiar



named cultivar is 'White Cloud', which is readily available online.

Like most ornamental grasses, it is deer resistant, and I mean totally resistant. For best effect, mass plant it against a dark evergreen background, where sunlight can filter through the blooms. It can stand light shade (where mine is), but like most grasses, it would prefer full sun. It is highly drought tolerant, but needs supplemental watering at planting or in deep drought. Some people recommend an application of 12-6-6 fertilizer in the spring.

When the clump is mature, it can be divided, but the divisions will look a bit lopsided where the vertical slice is taken. There is no solution to this. A British garden expert said that you should only propagate by seed, because divisions will always look one-sided. The British are pickier than I am. You must only divide your clump in early spring. I have tried dividing it in the fall and the roots freeze before they are able to establish.

The big controversy over muhly is whether or not it should be cut down to 1 ½ feet in January. I've heard grown men fight about it. I'm running a test with the purple muhly, trying it both ways. We'll see next spring.
